We refuse to stay cooped up behind the walls, we become curious about the lives of our neighbors, believing that God wants the best for them, and we enter into the reality of their lives bringing our own gifts to bear. It reminds me of the way God operates. God says a resounding "Yes, this is good" over creation. And God comes to be in the world, redeeming it from all that hinders life.

Les Carpenter in his recent book, The Gospel According to Improv: A Radical Way of Creative and Spontaneous Living, [Morehouse, 2022], says, "The choice to share the reality of those who are suffering is the logic of the Incarnation itself. 'Meeting

people where they are' isn't just a good strategy. It is salvation's root."

It's tempting, when we are in seasons of great change and dislocation, to turn inward and to try to create realities where we have a little more control. The invitation of the gospel is to turn outward, let go, and trust that God is

already present on the scene waiting for us to add what we have to offer.

This will be an exciting season for First UMC and Hinton Ave. UMC as our leadership groups hear from the Transition Team and take new steps in ministry. Will we be taken beyond our comfort zones? Yes. And...there are wonders for us yet to behold.

I'm glad we're on this journey together.

HINTON AVENUE'S LIBERIAN CONNECTION

Some six years ago, a Liberian family came to Hinton Avenue at the suggestion of a Liberian friend of theirs, Tommy George, who was the church's custodian. David and Cecelia Dorbor were here in Charlottesville with their daughters, 7-year-old Grace and 1-yearold Lomei, to obtain medical care for Grace from the University Medical Center. Grace had been born in rural Liberia in 2009 with a condition known as omphalocele, where her intestines and part of her liver developed outside her abdomen. Not only was medical expertise to treat Grace's condition lacking in Liberia—even in the capital city of Monrovia but the local tribal leaders who practiced voodoo saw Grace's birth as a bad omen and demanded that her parents give her over to be killed. When David and Cecelia refused to do so, they were ostracized, beaten, and threatened with death themselves.

What made this situation so highly charged was that David was a Christian pastor, and his defiance challenged not only the authority of the tribal leaders themselves but their system of beliefs. David had started five congregations in his rural community of Grand Bassa, and his ministry was seen as drawing support away from the practice of voodoo.

Working through various Christian mission aid groups, David and Cecelia were able to bring one-year-old Grace to this country in 2010, where she received the medical attention she needed, and then again four years later, both times at Vanderbilt Medical Center in Nashville. In between, they returned to Liberia and their five other children ranging in age from 3 to 20. Unfortunately, Grace's successful treatment in the U.S. did not stop the threats to David, Cecelia, and their family. Before returning to Vanderbilt in 2014, they placed the remaining children with various family members in and around Monrovia for their safety.

Following Grace's second round of treatments in Nashville, the family moved to Chicago, Philadelphia and finally to Charlottesville (where David had a cousin) because of the presence of the University of Virginia Medical Center. Their decision to make a home in this country meant extended separation from their son and four other daughters. However, with their safety in jeopardy should they return to Liberia, they focused their efforts on obtaining asylum in America. It was during this time that their seventh child and sixth daughter, Lomei, was born.

Once introduced to the Hinton Avenue congregation, the four Dorbors were not only warmly received but supported by numerous members of the church in their various immigration efforts: receiving Temporary Protected Status, obtaining work authorization cards, and applying for asylum. Persevering through changes in government administrations, work overloads and processing slowdowns at USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services), and disruptions from the COVID pandemic has been a challenge. However, in 2018 Grace was the first to be granted asylum—on medical grounds followed this year by her permanent resident status (green card).

David, Cecelia and the girls left Charlottesville for Columbus, Ohio, last summer, drawn by better employment opportunities, lower housing costs, and other family connections. Since that time, both parents have received their green cards and now, a year later, have been approved for citizenship. By the time you read this, Cecelia will have been sworn in as a new citizen, and David hopes to follow suit shortly thereafter. They continue to have strong emotional ties, however, to Charlottesville and their Hinton Avenue church family. They hope to pay a return visit to town in the near future to give thanks with us for all that God has done to make their American journey possible. Please stay tuned and plan to join in this celebration when the time comes!

PS: While Irene, my wife and I were away on vacation last month, we had an opportunity to visit the Dorbors in Columbus. Here are a few photos to introduce them (and us) to you. In a future newsletter, I hope to bring you up to date on the status of the other five Dorbor children.



HOMEBOUND COMMUNION MINISTRY

World Communion Sunday is celebrated the first Sunday every October. The tradition was begun in 1933 by Hugh Thomson Kerr, a minister at Shadyside Presbyterian Church. It soon spread to other denominations, and in 1940 the Federal Council of Churches (now the National Council of Churches) endorsed World Communion Sunday and began to promote it to Christian Churches worldwide.

Like Baptism, Holy Communion is regarded as a sacrament. That is, it is an act of worship ordained by Christ and is a means of grace. This does not mean that we become anymore worthy of God's grace by taking part in Communion. Rather, we open ourselves to the Divine love that's already there; we become more ready to receive that love and to respond to it. In Communion we celebrate the final victory of Christ. We anticipate God's coming reign, God's future for this world and all creation. We are partners with God in creating this future and it is in Communion that we find the nourishment we need for the tasks ahead.

However, there are many who are unable to receive the grace of the sacrament at the table in church. Through the Homebound Communion Ministry, they can receive the Eucharist in their home or nursing community and join in Christian fellowship at the Lord's table. CHURCH COUNCIL APPROVES SOLAR PANEL PLAN

The mail just arrived and there it is: the electric bill from all those summer days when it is just so beastly hot you need to turn the temperature in the house just a few degrees cooler. Or the bill from those cold spells in winter that forced you to wear an extra sweater and maybe bump up the thermostat just a teenie tiny bit. Maybe you are even wearing those battery-powered electric socks so you DON'T have to turn up the heat. (I hear they are a thing...not that I know from personal experience.)

You are pretty sure you have well-insulated the house but maybe you missed something. The ads for solar panels taunt you, tempting you to make the investment. It would be good for the climate, you tell yourself. It would be caring for God's creation.

Wait a minute. Isn't that the slogan of First Church's Creation Justice Team? There are people walking around the church wearing those round white buttons with those words on them, aren't there? Hmmm. What to do...

We are all called to be Caretakers of God's Creation, just as those little round buttons claim. An important part of that in these days of global warming is to minimize our contributions of greenhouse gasses to the atmosphere. Our Trustees have been working on this problem for several years, resealing our ancient windows, transitioning to higher efficiency air conditioning and heating systems, and LED lighting.

Well, we received some very exciting news from the Trustees: They are investigating an even larger reduction in our carbon footprint by installing solar panels on the church roof!! At its August meeting the Church Council affirmed the plan and committed to pursuing it, aided by a pledge from a generous donor.

I MEAN, YOU THINK YOUR HOUSE MIGHT BE LEAK-ING ENERGY? HOW ABOUT A BUILDING THAT IS AS OLD AS FIRST CHURCH??

There are some hurdles to jump to make it happen. Two issues to be addressed are securing approval from the Charlottesville Architectural Review Board and modifying the church wiring to accommodate solar power. The Green Team from Trustees is confident that both can be overcome. But don't expect to see solar panels on the roof any time soon: it could be a year before the installation begins.

We can Love the Whole City and Love the City Whole by helping make this project happen. We can be Caretakers of God's Creation by supporting this initiative and spreading the word. WE CAN SAVE NEARLY \$20,000 A YEAR ON OUR ELECTRICAL BILLS.

Did you get that? Twenty thousand dollars A YEAR. This investment is going to pay for itself in just a few years!

Now, maybe you can't get solar panels on your house yet. But what about helping get them on God's House?
